Note: This course is designed to be completely on-line. You are expected to additionally complete two 30-minute video chat tutoring sessions each week to improve pronunciation. Please contact me to arrange. Video chat tutoring sessions are scheduled according to your availability and are often one-on-one. Additionally, you are expected to spend about twelve hours per week interacting with the Blackboard material.

1. Course Description:

60 hours, 3 credits. Study of pronunciation and the elements of Irish grammar, reading of simple texts, and oral practice. Internet access and department permission required.

Grades earned throughout the semester are given both a letter grade and a numerical grade. For example an A- may be awarded a 90, 91, 92, or 93. While an A+ can be awarded on a class project (97,98,99, & 100), the instructor is not permitted to award an A+ as a final grade. Final grades are calculated by the Blackboard software and will be reported to the registrar as follows: 94%-100%, A; 90%-93%, A-; 87%-89%, B+; 84%-86%, B; 80%-83%, B-; 77%-79%, C+ and so on.

5. Course Text:

Project (See the syllabus for rough draft and final draft due dates)

You will research a five-page paper on the Irish Language. Use the brochure “Facts about the Irish Language” as a starting point. In your research paper, you are expected to answer the following questions:

1. What name do people use to describe the Irish language in English and Irish. If you grew up speaking another language, what would Irish be officially called in your language?
2. Why is Irish called the “first official” language of Ireland?
3. How many people speak Irish?
4. Where is Irish spoken?
5. Is Irish only taught as a second language in Ireland, or are there schools where Irish is actually used as the language of instruction in the school?
6. Discuss the role of Irish in the media. Are there TV and radio stations that broadcast in Irish?
7. What career opportunities exist for those who know the Irish language. What are some of the larger employers who require Irish language fluency as a job skill?
8. What are some of the reasons that Americans learn the Irish language?
9. Can you identify some famous Irish-speakers who are currently living?

Don’t forget to provide an introduction, and then go through each of the points above in paragraph form (not a list). Indicate points and then supporting information to help the reader understand the claims you make. In the end you must finish with a conclusion.

Please do not cut and paste from websites and place text in your paper. I have read most of the websites on these topics and will recognize this. If I find text that has not been properly inserted, I will return your paper and ask you to re-write. It will then be counted as late when you re-submit. Also if you properly give credit for phrases from the work of other's using quotation marks, please do not include more than 10% quotes in your paper (maximum 100 words). You must have a works cited list at the end of your paper.

Rubric for Project

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Paper achieving the grade of A should include many of the following

- + Paper clearly details facts about the Irish language.
- + The essay uses the brochure “Facts about the Irish Language” as a starting point.
- + Candidate's own thoughts and opinions have been included in the conclusion only.
- + Any quotes have been included in quotation marks not making up more than 10% of the paper. Source of quotes are noted at the end of the paper.

+ Essay is roughly five pages.

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Paper achieving the grade of B should include many of the following

- + Paper makes attempts to identify facts about the Irish language.
- + There appears to be some link between the brochure “Facts about the Irish Language” and the essay.
- + An attempt to include some of the candidate's own voice in the conclusion has been made.
- + Most quotes have been properly marked and cited.
- + Essay is roughly four pages or six pages.

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Paper achieving the grade of C should include some of the following

- + Paper makes attempts to identify facts about the Irish language, but there are some challenges.
- + There are a few links to the brochure “Facts about the Irish Language”.
- + A limited effort to include the student’s opinion at the end of the paper has been made.
- + A limited attempt to cite quotations has been made.
- + The ideas in this paper are either underdeveloped (causing the paper to be too short) or lack focus (causing the paper to be excessively long).
